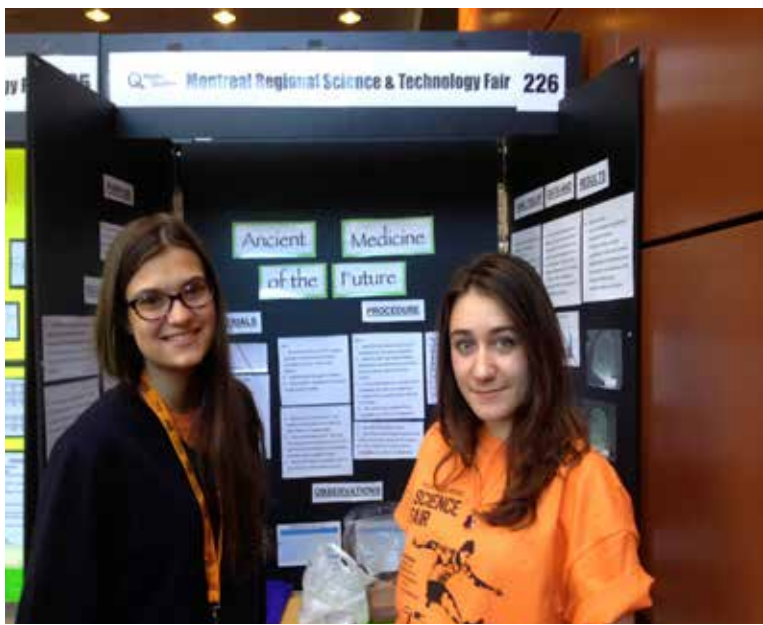
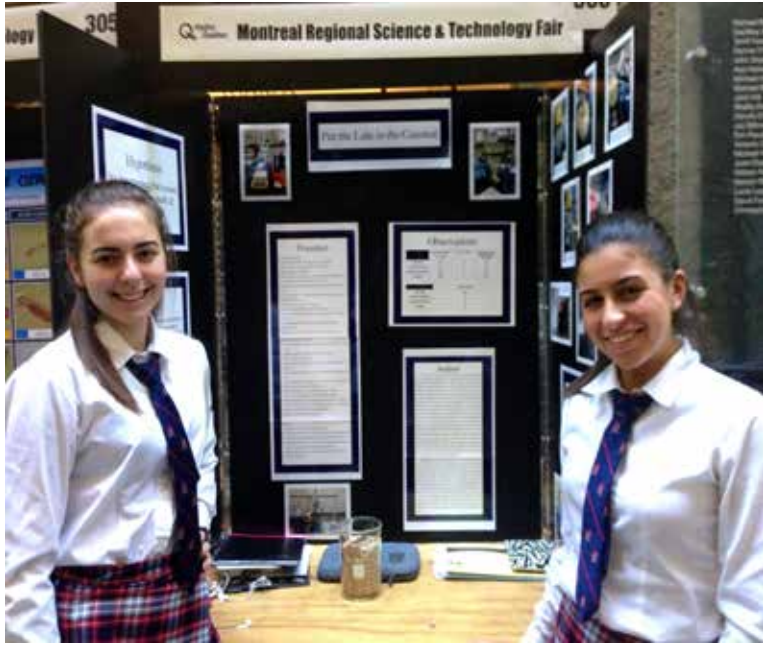


Kuper Welcomes New Canadians at Inaugural Citizenship Ceremony
